IN PARTNERSHIP WITH PRISON CHAPLAINCY

TITLE AND NUMBER: 80. Love one another

REFERENCE AND KEY VERSE(S): John 13: 33-35

[Jesus said] "My children, I will be with you only a little longer. You will look for me, and just as I told the Jews, so I tell you now: Where I am going, you cannot come. A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

LOOKING FURTHER: Matthew 25:34-40, 1 Corinthians 13 1-13

What does this Bible passage tell us?

Jesus gave His disciples a new commandment: that as He had loved them, so they should love one another. The love and fellowship shown in the early church enabled the growth of Christian communities across the world.

Jesus' love for those who were His friends was realistic and down to earth. He knew them all and understood their strengths and weaknesses. In the same way, God loves each one of us. As we become aware of how deeply we are loved by God, we are able to show this love and concern for others.

For years, volunteers from Prison Fellowship and from many other organisations have run chapel groups as part of supporting chaplaincy within prison. The chapel groups are fun, with lots of good humour and mutual support. They are also providing a space where people can explore and deepen their faith and where volunteers can learn from those who are in prison. These groups can be an opportunity to express God's love for one another as we pray for each other.

Your chaplaincy team may be able to help you find a church or an organisation which will welcome you into their fellowship and support you as you leave prison. This is the love that Jesus spoke about in action.
